
















# Maja WEEND!

## WOODRIDGE FOUNDATION

he Woodridge Foundation is registered as a non-profit organization (NPC) in terms of the Companies Act. It is a separate legal entity from the school and has Woodridge College and Preparatory School as its sole beneficiary. 


he grade 9s blew us away with their entrepreneurial efforts this year.

The OWA tug-o-war formed the event's grand finale with Carter House Old Woodridgeans taking the title with ease.


Prizegiving followed with Kohler House scooping the most points and winning the 2022 OE trophy.













## Deter Dan's Statue

In the very early days of World War 2 identical twins, lan and Robin Stewart, were enrolled at Woodridge Preparatory School. Their legacy still stands on the front lawn of the school, immortalised in the statue of Peter Pan. The head and face are those of the boys.

he artist responsible was their mother, Mrs H Stewart, also the creator of the statuette of Peter Pan's Wendy who stood for many years "a robust, sturdy, wind-swept child...bearing a shallow birdbath, her head thrown back with an air of interest and confidence" in the courtyard of Collegiate Junior School on Castle Hill. This was to replace the original Wendy from 1928 when Collegiate Junior School moved into their own building on Castle Hill. Mrs Stewart's Wendy eventually succumbed to the famous wind of Port Elizabeth and literally lost her head, so that Wendy Mark III was sculpted in 1956 and was later moved to the new school entrance when the schools moved to their present site.

It says much for Peter's stamina that Collegiate are currently blessed with their fourth Wendy while the young man struggles on against the elements, although much repaired and considerably weather-beaten. L.J.A.Carter, founding Headmaster and creator of stories for young minds, wrote the following in the late sixties:

"He has been standing there for nearly thirty years, Summer and Winter, on the old tree stump in the middle of the lawn. Softly he pipes (for those whose ears can catch the haunting melody) to those who have not been afraid to grow up – to keen ears and childlike understanding of the eternally youthful.

Sometimes on a moonlit summer's night, if you are very quiet, when everyone around you is asleep and you creep softly out of bed and look over the balcony, they say that you will see his friends, the wild creatures, gathered round him listening to his tunes of the forest, the rivers and flowers. Maybe you too, if you are very attentive and do not stir, will be able to catch a few wandering notes of the wild music".

The stump on which he stands has since been cemented over and encased in stone; previously it had held a bird bath, which served as the font when Julian Carter was christened there.
